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Erdman for moving in that direction. Senator Beutler then will offer an amendment which will expand that and, if it's the will of the body, I will support that because it involves more people, and I think the more that we have involved and actually listen to the better off we are. And I think if everybody remembers back to our debates on mental health that Senator Jensen brought to us last year with my support, support of the committee, we also started out with smaller numbers and came to larger numbers and came to more responsibility as far as the Behavioral Health Commission is...was...their involvement and the size of that group. And it, I think, has turned out to be very, very successful. We still have not accomplished everything we want and it's going to take a long time before we And I'm worried about what happens to behavioral health in this state with whatever we do. I'm not opposed to a plan. I've said that before. I say it again. I say it consistently. I'm just extremely concerned that we aren't going deep enough. Senator Jensen has talked repeatedly about the need for the plan, he's absolutely right, but every time he speaks about that plan he goes outside of it and talks about the other issues that come to bear on Medicaid, that aren't included. Now, maybe Senator Erdman is right, I hope so, in the fact that the committee and the people responsible for bringing ideas back to this Legislature will reach outside of this and come back with a report that does include all of those things and how should we do those different, and introduce legislation accompanying Medicaid reform that will deal with those issues. If that happens, then I applaud it. I think it needs to be done. know, we have a committee that's had task forces sitting out there right now that's dealing with this whole issue of the uninsured and dealing with many of the things that we're asking to be done in this study. We're already doing it, and they're going to be coming back with a report in May. Now again, we...oftentimes we start duplicating things and if we're talking about duplication and increased costs and what have you, maybe we need to look at what is already being done. We in this Legislature passed legislation last year to look at an area that's a substantial part of our Medicaid spending, and that's in the area of disabilities and what services do people with disabilities need. Are we basically forcing some people to receive more services than they need, and denying people who
