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medical benefits under Chapter 68." This one digression: Chapter 68 deals with public assistance. Continuing: "The report shall provide the following information for each business which has signed an agreement to receive tax incentives under the Employment and Investment Growth Act, the Employment Expansion and Investment Incentive Act, including the Enterprise Zone Act, the Invest Nebraska Act, or the Rural Economic Opportunities Act: (1) The name and address of the business; (2) The number of medical assistance beneficiaries who are employees of the business; (3) The number of medical assistance beneficiaries who are spouses or dependents of employees of the business; (4) Whether the business offers health benefits to its employees; and (5) The cost to the state of providing medical assistance benefits for the employees and enrolled dependents. The report shall not include the names of any individual medical assistance beneficiaries and shall be subject to privacy standards pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996. The report shall be submitted annually on February 1 to the Health and Human Services Committee of the Legislature and the Revenue Committee of the Legislature." Now, as I stated, Chapter 68 deals with public assistance. There was something else that I wanted to mention. You can look at the names of these various acts under which agreements can be reached for giveaways and other benefits to business. Oh, as far as the privacy, Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, that is popularly referred to as HIPAA, and the privacy requirements are stringent. Violation of those privacy standards carry substantial penalties. This information will be the basis for a report prepared jointly by the Director of Health and Human Services and the Tax Commissioner, or they can prepare their own and there can be two. But in any case, there will be nothing in those reports that will identify any specific beneficiary by name. This amendment goes to some of those other issues that have been discussed which have a direct bearing on the increased cost of Medicaid. Let's say that a business provides insurance for an employee but tells that employee, your spouse and your children will not be covered. And if the employee says, well, with my salary, even though my insurance...I meant my medical care is provided for, I cannot, on my salary, afford to provide private insurance coverage for my spouse and my children. And
