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you get it's hard to afford your share of the insurance. But I'm not...that's not different than a lot of small employers, so I want to clarify that. But as we get more and more Wal-Marts in this state, we're driving more and more businesses out, whether they be small employers or mid-sized or even large employers. And an awful lot of those businesses being driven out do have health benefits. So it does concern me. But not just the Wal-Marts, but I think that we need to have information. This is a study. We need to have information of where our Medicaid dollars are going. And when we get that information, we can use it to make better informed decisions in the future. So I am listening to the discussion, but I am very heavily looking at voting for this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Cunningham. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion, Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. May I ask Senator Synowiecki a question, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, you may. Senator Synowiecki, will you yield?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes.

SENATOR JENSEN: Was this in a form of a bill that was introduced this year, Senator?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: No, Senator.

SENATOR JENSEN: Okay. Well, let me just say a couple of things. As you may or may not be aware, Health and Human Services is looking at a new information system and are certainly...I know the Appropriations Committee is aware of that. I don't know how many dollars we have in N-FOCUS. Large, I do know that; well over \$100 million, I believe. And the new system, it's my understanding is somewhere around \$35 million of which I think that we can get a federal match on that of about 90 percent, but still would be another \$3.5 million to install such a system. Now it's my understanding that we can take, and we can get some of this information on N-FOCUS by checking a
