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provision of these services, overlapping coordination. I'm not sure that we are getting the best bang for our buck. And I'm not sure that we...and maybe the study is the way to answer it. But we've already put a lot of money into this system. And obviously, something about the structure isn't working, because we didn't know prior to about a month ago or two months ago that this was going to happen. How could we not have planned for the planned obsolescence of a system that we knew...if the contracts had dates of 2006, we had to know that this was going to happen. is the structure and our coordination that I'm concerned about. And I'm not certain that we're going to get enough of the information. Now, Senator Raikes is saying that that's a part of what the study is. But let's go back and look at how much we've already invested. And the result in terms of the ... and the result has been that we didn't even know until the contracts were ready to expire that they were going to expire. So we had no way to plan for it. That doesn't cause me to have great deal of sentiment that we assume that these numbers are And it's not that I'm arguing with it. But I have seen in the discussions that we've had on e-911, on the safety telecom, that we get these huge numbers and the immediacy of doing it, but nobody wants to change the delivery system, nobody wants to change the coordination, nobody acknowledges that part of the problem is the coordination and the delivery system.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: So I'm going to listen a great deal more. But I'm not arguing that our students don't need to have this as a methodology to expand the horizons of their education. It's just that I'm not certain that our structure is supporting the right kinds of things. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Redfield, followed by Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I pushed my light again so that I would have a little more time to explore with Senator Raikes some of the issues that I was raising before. Again, going back and asking the right questions may be the crucial piece here for the task force.
