squirrel. That's the one we see around here. There's also the ground squirrel we see out in the country, and there is no protection for the ground squirrel. And we also have the chipmunks that are not protected but they're a part of the squirrel...but there is a flying squirrel in southeast Nebraska and apparently it has the webbed things and can glide. You know, if I jumped out of a tree I'd fall pretty hard, but one of these flying squirrels can glide to another tree and so...but I guess it is protected. It's found in southeast Nebraska. So that's what little I can add to the conversation, but is no protection for the ground squirrel or the...there apparently the chipmunk, but I can't imagine anybody going out and shoot chipmunks, and I would assume their range is somewhat limited in this state. Probably up in the Chadron area they have chipmunks in those rocks and hills. So...and if you have a question, why, I'd be glad to try and answer any more on my time. So, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: From your...from gathering your information, did they say anything about prairie dogs being deemed squirrels for the purpose of being protected under...

SENATOR SCHROCK: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHROCK: No, the prairie dog is not protected;...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...can be hunted year-round and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank...

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...the only thing you need is a...if you're a resident, you don't need a hunting license. If you're a nonresident, you need a...you need a hunting license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right. If Senator Chambers has no more, I
