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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, it doesn't say that in my caption. I don't see "clown" anywhere in there and...

SENATOR JENSEN: No, no, I don't either.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I don't see any makeup on his face either, if you ask me, unless you consider whiskers to be makeup, in which case I would have to fall under that category, which I don't accept.

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator, what is your repertoire of pictures and like these?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that came from the legislative review, which everybody gets a copy of.

SENATOR JENSEN: Oh, okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I guess I read things and others don't. (Laugh) But...

SENATOR JENSEN: I hadn't read that one yet.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...but that was all I was going to ask you, Senator Jensen, to establish that the quality of these helmets is not at issue. So when these organizations and groups are just saying passionately...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that they favor people having to wear helmets pursuant to universal helmet laws can be misleading. They are not looking at whether or not the device or item worn on the head is genuinely going to contribute to the likelihood of survival; just so something is on the head. The federal government does not withhold funds anymore. Nebraska apparently does not have any standard that is enforced consistently around the state with reference to the protective ability of these helmets. Oh, how I wish Senator Smith had not challenged me. I could help him. But I can't because he made that impossible.
