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things which the government will do, even by accident, which will benefit all of the citizens to some extent. I don't know that requiring people to wear a motorcycle helmet would fit within that realm of issues that the U.S. government ought to act in, and the U.S. government has withdrawn from that area. It used to threaten to take funds from states that don't compel the wearing of helmets. So for some reason, and it's probably political, the federal government has gotten out of dictating in that area. Now it's left to the individual states. Senator Schrock is so worried that the people in this state are going to abolish trapping, hunting and fishing. He ought to have argued, well, they make people wear helmets. I'd like to ask Senator Schrock...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator...is Senator Schrock...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, that's all right. He's occupied. I'll...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, are you on the...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Don't bother him now. I can do that later. I'm wondering if the right to wear a...ride a motorcycle without a helmet ought to be protected in the constitution. Oh, Senator Schrock is here but we only have a few seconds so I will pose that question the next time I'm recognized. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion on the bracket motion, Senator Byars, followed by Senator Smith and others.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. You know, I know that Senator Smith has been very genuine in his debate and in his passion to do away with helmets in the state of Nebraska, and I don't think he intentionally stated in his last discussion on this floor the fact that the Nebraska Nurses Association or
