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in--I'm dealing with the stereotypes now--nervous, eyes bloodshot, he's shaking like a leaf on a tree and he says, I want some Sudafed, and this man says, you got to give me some identification. He said, okay, well, I think I'll identify myself. You heard of these hyphenated last names? And the guy said, yes. He said, well, my...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...hyphenated name is Smith and Wesson; give me what I'm asking you for. That's what you want? You think that's not going to happen? You're going to say these are dangerous people on the very edge, then you're going to put these ordinary civilians in a position where they have to stop them and challenge them over some Sudafed? Preposterous. I don't care on this one what the World-Herald writes as an editorial. I don't care what the State Patrol says. I don't care what anybody says. That bill, LB 117 is going to get a working over, and you all could probably get cloture on it. I don't care really what you do on LB 70. I've had a chance to see time taken on it, but I will not support Senator Smith's amendment that he's offering for the reasons that I gave. The other day I offered to amend Senator Jensen's amendment to strike everything that he put in it except a provision...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that would have prohibited enforcement all the way of these penalties, not a moratorium but abolish them. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion, Senator Smith. (Microphone malfunction)...waives his opportunity. Senator Byars. Waives his opportunity, Senator Byars, so you are next.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you much, Senator Cudaback. I don't think it will probably be any great surprise to members of the body that I would be opposed to Senator Smith's amendment. I have been an advocate for years for stronger safety measures in the form of seat belts moving from a secondary to a primary law. I
