SENATOR FRIEND: One thirty-five, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Thank you, Senator Aguilar. I disagree with Senator Chambers' assessment of the situation. He's been here for over 30 years. I mean, he's seen "feel-good" bills come down the pike more than any of us. If I got a whiff in Judiciary Committee that this was a "feel-good" bill, I would have been there to help kill it, or I wouldn't have voted it out. And I'm saying that I'm any different, or any better than anybody else in that committee. But after three years, I can kind of get a whiff of some of those "feel-good" bills, too. I've seen them out here on the floor. My committee has probably kicked a few out. I apologize for that. But what I'm telling you is, I don't believe this is a "feel-good" bill. People, kids, teachers, parents, but especially legislators, we're reactionary by nature. Human beings are reactionary. It's how you deal with your reactions that's important. Everybody has those reactions. Controlled, deliberate maneuvering, after you have that type of reactionary feeling, is the key. I believe this legislation is controlled, it's deliberate. We're dealing with specific...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You're welcome. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion on the Beutler amendment, the first component, divided committee amendment. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I will totally agree with Senator Aguilar and Senator Dwite Pedersen's discussion about treatment. We have to be, you know...really work on the treatment. But let's look a little bit further. We need to prevent it, so we don't have to treat the people. We can't continue to treat and treat and treat, if we're not going to work on the prevention. The only way we're
