SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

And on the front of it, it says "Methamphetamine, What, Where, How" provided by the Midwest HIDTA--whatever that is---and the Omaha Police Department--I know what that is--funded by the COPS Office methamphetamine grant. When I opened this paper, there is something like a green ribbon across the top on which is written "Methamphetamine..."

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, Senator Chambers.
