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SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'll wait until I'm recognized again, and then I have another question or two, if you don't mind.

SENATOR BOURNE: Certainly.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senators Chambers and Bourne. Senator Beutler, your light is next.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Bourne, I would like to follow up on some of Senator Chambers' questions and some of the information you gave us earlier, just so mechanically I understand better, and we understand better what we're talking about.

SENATOR BOURNE: Certainly.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Did I...would it be correct to say that those 48 tablets that you're talking to translate to 1.4 grams, roughly?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bourne, would you like...

SENATOR BOURNE: I believe so, Senator Chambers...or...that's twice today I've called you Senator Chambers. I apologize. Yes, I believe that's the case, 1.4 grams.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, and so basically, to get up to what you described to Senator Janssen as the amount that you would need to stir the meth pot, it would take about six days' worth of legitimate purchases to get to that nine grams; wouldn't that be correct?

SENATOR BOURNE: That sounds about right, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, so you could go every day for six days, and you'd have enough to make meth, or...with no log. If you were in a large town like Lincoln, you could go to six different stores in one day and get enough to make it.

SENATOR BOURNE: That's...that's true, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Now on the liquid side, help me
