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my question.

SENATOR BOURNE: Sure, in this particular example, Children's Benadryl, you can buy two 20-tablet packs. Now that's 40 tablets that you can buy every day, so you'd have to have a large family, you know, to run out of this children's product.

SENATOR REDFIELD: So a tablet every four hours...

SENATOR BOURNE: I don't think it's a tablet...I think these...

SENATOR REDFIELD: Eight hours?

SENATOR BOURNE: ...are one tablet a day, but I'm not 100 percent sure.

SENATOR REDFIELD: All right. I just wanted to make sure that we were not putting a burden on certain brands or certainly putting a burden on people who might have multiple family members, during certain seasons of the year--allergy seasons--or a cold. Certainly, when it struck my house, it went through and all eight of us would generally have a cold. So I just wanted to make sure that we were making allowances for that. But I certainly support the bill and would hope that we would examine that before we get to Select, to make sure we have the right amounts in here. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senators Redfield and Bourne. Senator Louden, you are recognized to speak.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. I wasn't going to get into this debate, but I do have some concerns that I'm beginning to wonder about. I supported the bill for the most part, and when it was first talked about and when I first read it. But as some of this, as we're going on, I'm beginning to wonder if we're maybe creating another class of criminals here. I noticed in there that if they, somebody sells this material to someone, why, there's a fine and something...they have to pay a fine or whatever.
