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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Louden. Senator Beutler, there is about one minute and twenty seconds left.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Bourne, let me throw out quickly something I noticed they do in Oklahoma, with regard to this liquid-versus-dry problem. You have described a situation. I have described some states.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Some of them think liquid can be converted without too much additional trouble. Apparently, it's either more...to some degree more trouble, or to some degree takes more material. Some states don't think it's a problem; others think that it is. The report I get is that Iowa has turned up two places that used liquid. Nebraska hasn't turned up any that used liquid. What they do in Oklahoma is that they authorize a member of the executive branch to add products to the behind-the-counter section, as they, in a pragmatic fashion, determine them to be a problem in their state. So they started out in Oklahoma, and liquids didn't have to go behind the counter.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time, Senator Beutler. Thank you, Senators Beutler and Louden. Senator Burling, you are recognized to speak.

SENATOR BURLING: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I want to support the bill. I like the concept, but I also have some concerns like some of the other members of the body, that this may not produce the results we want, but we need to give it a try. I have a question for Senator Bourne, if he'd yield.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bourne, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR BOURNE: Of course.

SENATOR BURLING: Senator Bourne, did I hear you in your opening mention Claritin-D on your list?
