With technology nowadays, they can do about anything. Maybe that's the thing we need to do. I'm sure that back in the Rotunda when they hear those words of charging them to do something, they're probably really shaking and jumping. But that would have a real impact if we do that. So I'm sure that isn't what we're going to be doing right now. But coming from the words of probably the shortest senator here on the floor, about four inches shorter than Senator Chambers--I can tell you that because I've got a picture of him and I together, and he is quite a bit taller.
