talking about. Why are we dealing with this right now? I don't think it's coincidence. Again, I just had approached some of the folks here on the floor and talked about, is there a number that's better than this? Because, you know to me, we're arguing about whether there was an agreement or not. Nothing is written down on paper. I don't know how we're going to...well, except for Senator Mines has something...has some, you know, dialogue from two years in the floor debate. Goodness, I hope nobody goes back and, you know, and grabs...well, now they will, but grabs the dialogue that I've thrown out there, holds to me to that type of standard. Obviously, I want to do something for the...for our local communities. This makes sense, but it appears to me that there's an argument or disagreement over whether there was, you know, really a concrete deal cut or not. And I would even go so far as to say whether this is the right amount. I even brought it up, like I said, off the record a couple...on a couple of occasions. If this isn't the right amount, I'd like to find out what is. But frankly, I stand by what I said before. If we're going to do something like this which, to me, doesn't rise, you know, to the level of some of the other things that we've been talking about today, yesterday, and the day before, then we ought to revisit some of these issues, and we ought to really start putting great and serious thought, I believe, into some of these other points that people think are frivolous, because I do think this is politically motivated. Not necessarily by Senator Mines, Senator Bourne or even myself. I think it's politically motivated because of what I brought up before. I don't think it's coincidence that it's here. Of politicians, managers, in the city of Omaha and other places, thumping their chest and talking about how they haven't had to raise taxes. It's not a political thing from that standpoint; it's a practical thing. Why haven't they had to? Well, we did it for them. They've got the money; now they want more. I guess I'm willing to give it to them, but I'm willing to talk about how much it should be. I guess I'd leave it at that. How much should it be? If this isn't the right amount, let's talk about what the amount is. Maybe this is the right amount. If we're going to just keep talking about whether there's an agreement or whether there wasn't, whether there was an agreement or not, I don't think we're going to get anywhere. We're going to sit here for another 45 minutes talking, you
