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this particular bill. We could discuss it now or on the next time around.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. But still, could they approach the state and try to negotiate to obtain what you want to do by way of this bill?

SENATOR PAHLS: If both parties would do it. Appears...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the feeling...go ahead.

SENATOR PAHLS: It appears to me in the past that one side said that they could not do it because of rules and regulation; the other side was under the impression that this money that was allocated in the past was supposed to be spread out over all 15 of them. And there was some dissension in that. And Senator Schimek was involved in that, and I would entertain talking about this more in the future.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we can talk about it right now ...

SENATOR PAHLS: Sure. Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...on the A bill, because this is the funding. Without this A bill, the underlying bill is of no value. Isn't that true?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR PAHLS: Yes, of no value.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So why should we not discuss the heart of the monster rather than just the shell of the monster?

SENATOR PAHLS: Okay. Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This is the heart, isn't it?

SENATOR PAHLS: Yes. Yeah. Yes, without the monies and in Section 2, there's no reason to be talking.
