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between now and Select File. But I think if it can be narrowed to that particular area, then it fits together very well with Senator Cunningham's piece, and fits into the whole package very well. But it would be good, I think, to put focus on that ag-related area. And I would even be willing to suffer additional funds in that particular area, because it's not very much. But that would be for others to decide. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I will leave, for the time being, the ethanol boondoggle. No, I'll stay on that, because we're going to deal with Senator Cunningham's segment, and that will give me a chance to lambaste that program. But I'm not going to try to stop any parts of this bill. What was done yesterday was so nauseating to me--my colleagues standing on the floor, praising business. And then I heard, wafting from out there in the lobby, the strains of that song: "Whatever Lola Wants, Lola Gets." And I listened, and I heard it again, like the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. And that's what applied to the Legislature. Fair is fair, even when we're dealing in an area of total irresponsibility. I think giving business all of what they gained yesterday was wrong. I think it was immoral. I think it's hurtful to the ordinary people who were not figured into the equation. The rural senators went along with it. For their foolishness, perhaps they should suffer. But they're part of the body, and they're entitled to their bite out of the public, out of the suckers, out of the taxpayers who don't know what the Legislature is doing. So I'm going to support what they're doing. I'm going to support them trying to get what they want. Senator Cunningham knows that I don't like his segment of the bill especially. But he agreed that when we get to his portion and it's added to the bill, an amendment will be offered so that when these grants are given to the counties and the cities...his bill is aid to municipalities and counties. The grants go only to the counties and the municipalities. Not to individuals, not to businesses, only to the counties and the cities. There's a provision that says they will have to make a dollar-for-dollar match in money or in-kind services. He's willing to strike the "in-kind services" part.
