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SENATOR LANDIS: ...make the retail experience different is the aspect of nature scenes that run throughout the operations in Cabela's. That's one aspect that's different. Secondly, this winds up being destination tourism for which people are likely to drive greater distances than they would otherwise. It is something for which, given the history of these customers in this kind of a setting, you can define...you can see the practice of people traveling considerable distances to go to this. This attracts out-of-state business, and that's different than other kinds of operations. And in the time that I've got left, those are the answers that I'll provide on this light.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Landis. You have 18 seconds left, Senator Brown. Would you like to finish that? Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is probably one of those issues where you have to hold your nose and vote for it, I believe, and I'll tell you why. By the way, Senator Landis, cumulatively Game and Parks is the number-one tourist destination in the state, and, you know, you throw Lake McConaughy and Mahoney State Park in there. I have a map of the Game and Parks facilities here, if anybody would like to look at it. And if anybody wants a map, they're welcome to it. But you know, Game and Parks is very valuable to us as a tourist destination. But I think other things are valuable, and I think we need to develop tourism in this state. And we don't have a lot of mountains, we don't have a lot of mountain streams, we don't a lot of natural places to go, although we have some good ones. We just probably don't promote them enough, and people think of Nebraska as a state to drive through so they can get to Colorado or Wyoming or what...or South Dakota. So I will tell you that in the year 2002, Iowa generated \$249 million in gambling revenues, and certainly some of that came from eastern Nebraska. What's that have to do with this? It means they have a war chest we have to compete with. And I, for one, think we need to compete. And I was talking to Senator Beutler at lunch...dinner last night. He asked me what I was going to do when the session was over. What was the job on the farm? I said, well, the corn is planted and the cattle are taken care of. We'll have plenty to cultivate and
