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that you can now look for different attractions. I think Cabela's is one of those that I hope that can come to the eastern part of Nebraska. Again, you've got Interstate 29 on the other side. You would have people going north and south that would swing over into Nebraska to not only tour but to buy products that Cabela's would sell. And I look at, what is the downside of this bill? The only downside is giving up a portion of the sales tax revenue that you don't have today and you won't have tomorrow unless you do something like this. And then you're giving up a portion of those for a short period of time, not forever, and it's just amazing. Now I come from the real estate and the construction industry. And for years, and look at it right now today in Omaha, apartments for rent,...

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...free rent for 60 days, maybe even 90 days. We have commercial buildings that will say, low rent or we will forego the first six months rent for you to move in. Those are just business incentives that are there all the time. It's just a matter of business, to get somebody in, to get somebody into that situation. So those kind of deals are there. Now this is a situation where the state is saying, okay, we'll partner with you. We'll deal with you. You come in, you're going to be a large sales tax producer, and we're going to say we're going to forego a little bit of that income for a short period of time. Then after that, we get it all. I don't see what that downside is. To me, it makes sense, whether it be Cabela's, whether it be an amusement park, or some other entity where they can bring a lot of people. It makes just good economic sense to me. And so I would say....

SENATOR JANSSEN: Time.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...let's not do the bracket motion. Let's take a look at this situation. I think Senator Landis has put some very good opportunity there. This doesn't go on forever. It has a window where we can try this. If it don't work, we stop.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Time, Senator Jensen. Time.
