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retail, is not what we normally do. Those are two ways in which this bill doesn't fit the way we normally do business. And if the virtues and benefits, the possibility of growth and employment, do not outweigh those, the right answer would be to vote no, to protect the income stream where it is, because Lord knows, we've got plenty of good ways to spend sales tax money. However, will we get this sales tax money without the bill? Open question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: If you were a businessman and the state of Texas said to you, build your store here and we'll give you 40 million bucks, and the state of Nebraska says, build your store here because we think you're swell. Good luck. We love you, we're proud to have you as a citizen, we're going to tax you with a relatively high tax basis and the tax climate because you don't get one of our tax incentives. We're going to tax...your goods will sell at a 7 percent sales tax rate, compared to sales tax rate in the areas that some of which are lower, but we want you to come because we just think you're swell. As a businessman, which decision would you choose? Because that's the decision that Cabela's faces. And from my perspective, I could understand why they would choose Nebraska with assistance and help like this or forego being in Nebraska and going someplace else for states that are willing to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...reach out and make contributions and incentives.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Landis. Further discussion on the motion to bracket to 6-3-05, Senator Redfield, followed by Senator Synowiecki and others.
