Then you're going to run out...well, you won't run out here and eat dinner this evening on the lobbyists, because we get to leave at 6:00 so we can go vote. And as for Senator Brown saying she voted before she came and I didn't, that just shows that I'm more on my job. The polls were not even open in Omaha before I got to Lincoln. That's the difference. I take this job more seriously. But again, we're what they call a citizen Legislature, so you can come when you want to and leave when you please and do whatever or nothing that you want to when you get here. I just see my work differently, so I cannot really say that anybody ought to conduct himself or herself as I do. But here's where I'm critical. I say be honest. Don't be hypocritical. Don't come in here and pray and pretend that all that stuff means something. I've heard senators stand up there and tell God to tell us how to use wisdom, knowledge, do what's right for the people. They pray that, not me. They talk that, not me. They invoke the name of Jesus Christ, not me. So what is it all for? When time comes to act, where are you? You know what your Jesus said, your Jesus, not mine? Why call me...why call you me Lord, Lord, and do not the things that I say? To update it, why do you sit up there every morning and invoke my name, then when you're on the floor, you do things that are contrary to what you know you ought to do? Where I wouldn't even have such a thing...such a religion as that unless I wanted to be free to do anything and everything I wanted to and still call myself righteous. I can lie, I can trick the people, I can be a hypocrite, and still be in good standing with my religion and my church. That stuff is worthless to me. I have to be honest. I do feel somewhat superior in my nonreligion and my nonreligious status. I don't talk about Wal-Mart being bad over there and then I'm going to give "Caballa's" this over here. Senator Cunningham and the grocers should be protected from Wal-Mart, but other retail establishments shouldn't be protected from this big retail operation? As much as Senator Beutler wants this bill, and as meticulous as Senator Beutler is, he knows this is a retail bill. It's for a retail establishment. Senator Redfield, who is going to support this bill, said how ironic it is that when a woman goes to retail establishments to make purchases, she's shopping.
