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There's...they have all kinds of material, things to buy in their establishments. Now, would you rather go...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what do you think will happen...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...would you rather go down to a small, let's say, fishing tackle store in Omaha that sells fishing poles and so on, so forth, it's 25 foot wide and maybe 60 feet long; or go into this big fancy place where there is thousands and thousands of different flies and material? You know where you'd go.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I can just see it, Senator, unfolding before my eyes. I would go to the big one.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Because that's where all the fancy stuff is at.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then what would become of this little 2-foot-wide, 60-foot-long operation?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, the first thing he'd do is, if he had a couple employees, a couple of young high school kids, you know, give them a job, helping them out, help them get started, he'd have to say, well, Johnny, I'm sorry, but I'm not selling enough fishing equipment this year to keep you on; I'm going to have to let you go. So that kid is going to have to find another job somewhere, because he's trying to help himself through school, and maybe help his family.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if the results were bad enough, that individual may go out of business, actually.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely. And there will be one more vacant spot in downtown Omaha.
