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SENATOR BURLING: Well, it reduced the membership of the commission in half from what I proposed originally, and reduced the cost.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But as far as the duties and responsibilities, and any power...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the commission would have...you said time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion? Senator Engel, followed by Senator Chambers. Senator Engel, you're...you may speak, if you care to.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. President, members of the body, I just have a couple of questions for Senator Burling, if he wouldn't mind. I see on here where one representative of the labor sector appointed by Executive Board, and one representative of the low-income sector appointed by the Executive Board of the Legislative Council. And I was wondering, could you give me a little guidance on how these people would be chosen as far as a representative of the labor sector and who you have in mind there, and of course low-income sector, if there's any specific area you're talking about there.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling, will you yield?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes, I will. Thank you, Senator Engel. That inclusion on the commission came about with the passage last May of the Beutler amendment, and your specific question about how to select those people is something that will just have to be discussed in the Executive Board session, and those of us who have been involved with this will certainly be...try to be helpful, but it doesn't give any more explicit information to the Executive Board in the bill.
