SENATOR ENGEL: Well, the reason we ask is, this is quite broad as far as who we might choose there. We thought we'd maybe get a little bit more guidance. Perhaps if Senator Beutler would...maybe he could answer that, if it was his amendment. Senator Beutler, would you respond to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you...Senator Beutler, are you...would you respond to a question from Senator Engel?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, I'm not sure. I haven't been following the conversation, so I'm not sure if the language is mine or not, but what language are you explicitly concerned about?

SENATOR ENGEL: Well, what I'm referring to is on the amendment, on the Section 2, number (5), one representative of the labor sector appointed by Executive Board, and number (7), one representative of the low-income sector appointed by the Executive Board, and as far as a definition of who. You know, that's pretty...quite a wide area in both cases there, and I was wondering if just...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, Senator, as you're aware, it's very difficult to say that that person shall come from X, Y, or Z labor group, or from a particular nonprofit corporation or whatever. My concern is satisfied if people representing those areas are appointed, and I felt more comfortable with the Exec Board appointing those people, because of the broader representation on the Exec Board, than I did with the Governor appointing those people, because when a commission is appointed entirely by one person, regardless of that person's philosophy, the people will tend to be of that same philosophy, as you're well aware from your years of experience. So I wanted to get those on to the Exec Board, where we could have a good discussion about who would be a good representative of labor and low income.

SENATOR ENGEL: Well, I'm in agreement with you on that. So we'll hash that out in Exec Board. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Chambers,
