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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BURLING: ...economies change and we...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me proceed, if I may, because now you've told me that what you feel needs to be done is this periodic review, and your opinion is that the commission that you're attempting to establish here would undertake that periodic review. Now, what is to be accomplished as a result of that review? And let me elaborate a bit. If this commission is created, it conducts a review, it's going to produce some kind of report which contains conclusions and recommendations. Is that generally true?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes, it calls for a report to be presented to the Executive Board and to the Governor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And how much do you think it would cost to produce that report?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, we've estimated \$100,000.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A hundred Gs. Okay. What is there in the law that requires anything to be done with that report other than the submission of it to the Exec Board?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, it's up to the Legislature then, after they've received the report, what to do with it. That's what they did with the other reports that have been given.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there any way, so that this money would have some better use, that we could divide 49 into that \$100,000 and distribute that among the members of the Legislature instead of giving it...making this report?

SENATOR BURLING: Yeah, we probably could do that, but we'd have the same effect on the tax code as we...that's what we're doing now, is 49 senators have ideas. (Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Burling, as a result of any studies that have been undertaken of the tax code by any individual, any
