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committee viewed that you wanted to keep it small enough to keep the cost down, and so this was kind of a compromise to have those two trains of thought considered and met.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what is the cost going to come from as far as the makeup of the committee...the commission? Will there be a cost for each commission member and, therefore, reducing the number would reduce that cost? Or is this supposed to reduce the overall cost of the work of the commission?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, keeping the membership down reduces the costs of mileage and the out-of-pocket expenses that the commission members will expend to do their duty. It calls for a facilitator that will have to come out of the \$100,000. I think a facilitator is important.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who is going to select the facilitator?

SENATOR BURLING: Executive Board.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How much will the facilitator be paid?

SENATOR BURLING: We don't know yet. They have...usually they let contracts on that, or take bids.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what is a facilitator going to do?

SENATOR BURLING: Facilitator usually runs the meetings in an unbiased atmosphere and opinion and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then...

SENATOR BURLING: ...just keeps the meetings moving.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the facilitator would, in a sense, be like a mule skinner,...

SENATOR BURLING: Many...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the one who sits on the wagon and cracks the whip over the mules to make them go.
