

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you work in the daytime?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you work at night?

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How large a percentage of your work would you say was done at night? What percentage? Ten percent or more?

SENATOR BURLING: Ten or twenty, I suppose.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What would you be doing at night with reference to production agriculture?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BURLING: A lot of things. I mean, you got lights on your equipment. You can do all kinds of things in the fields at night.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, so far all you told me is that you might drive equipment and turn the light on, but I want to know what, with reference to production agriculture, you did with that equipment that had the light on it.

SENATOR BURLING: Any activity that is necessary on the farm to produce agricultural products can be done at night if you have lights.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I still don't know what these products are or what the production is that's being undertaken. I'm a city slicker.

SENATOR BURLING: Harvesting, tilling the soil.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, so you till and you harvest at night.

SENATOR BURLING: Yes.
