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SENATOR BURLING: Probably.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since we're talking about a better tax structure, if we save money it means that there is less that the taxpayers will have to pay to fund this commission. Isn't that true?

SENATOR BURLING: The fewer there are the less it would cost, I think.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Wouldn't that be good?

SENATOR BURLING: Not necessarily.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you one of those who's supporting all this talk about tax cuts this session?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, depends on what they are.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, why, on your bill, can't you exemplify your philosophy by cutting some money that the taxpayers will have to pay right here? Isn't this a practical way for us to show that we mean what we say when we talk about cutting taxes? Can't we cut how much the taxpayers will pay by cutting the membership on this commission? We can, can't we?

SENATOR BURLING: By cutting the membership on the commission you'll reduce the credibility of the report.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't care about that. I'm talking about the taxpayers, because that's what the Governor is going to yap about, that's what my colleagues are going to "yippity-yap" and yelp about. We don't care about the commission. We're concerned about the taxpayer. Isn't that what they're going to be saying?

SENATOR BURLING: Maybe.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you concerned about the taxpayer this morning, Senator Burling?
