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SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, we have elaborated and discussed and arrived at these conclusions as possibly flowing from this language, but the language doesn't say what you and I have been talking about, does it? Let me read the language. "Examine the impact of changes in the fundamentals of the Nebraska economy on the revenue adequacy..."

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: "...and stability for the state." It doesn't say stability of the tax system, stability of the economy, stability of anything, but stability for the state. Maybe they mean political stability. It doesn't make it clear. So would it be better to try to rewrite that, or just strike that provision?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Senator Chambers, in our discussion, it's...I think the first couple words in...on line 27, "Examine the impact of changes," you know, is this...is...if there is a change in it, if there should be a change, you know, will that affect the revenue adequacy and the stability of it, or should there be no recommendations?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think my time is just about up, so that's all I will ask you. Thank you, Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Further discussion on FA327? Seeing no lights on, Senator Chambers, I recognize you to close on FA327 to LB 542.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, there was a person trying to impress a very intellectually oriented young woman, so every time he would see her, his heart would flutter, his palms would get moist, but his mouth would go dry. So this time, he was able to get out a few words, and to impress her he said, Sally, this really is some amphibious weather we're having, isn't it? She said, what do you mean? He said, I mean it's cold. She said, well, why didn't you say so? This is some chameleon-like, amphibious language that we're
