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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that was to be covered by subsection (16) (sic) when they are examining demographic changes?

SENATOR BURLING: I think so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why would you be opposed to pinning that down, so it doesn't get lost in the shuffle and they don't limit their study, when they're talking about the movement of people,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers. You may continue. Your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they're not just talking about people leaving the rural area and coming into the cities, or those who develop a degree of understanding and intelligence leaving the state? Maybe that's all they're going to examine, what they call the brain drain, or the decimation of the population base in the rural areas. They could limit their examination to those things under this broad language, couldn't they?

SENATOR BURLING: Well, they could, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think...?

SENATOR BURLING: My intent was that they would include everything, even what you're suggesting.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that the issue of undocumented workers is significant enough to be specified for the purpose of study, the treatment of undocumented workers?

SENATOR BURLING: I think it's (inaudible)...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think it's a serious enough issue to be specified?

SENATOR BURLING: If we specify that one, we probably need to specify some more, and that could really...
