SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm honored.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. In my opinion, what is meant by, in line 15, "term-limited out"? At what...what group of people are term-limited out, right now?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, the way you phrased your question, Senator (laugh), even though I'm honored to engage with you, I can't answer it, because you said, quote, in my--speaking of yourself--view, what does it mean? I can't tell. Do you want me to tell you what, in my view, it might mean?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. "Term-limited out." That is clumsy language, but I think they might mean that those who will not be able to run again, after the session which we are serving now. And there will come an election this year, and they will serve until their replacement is qualified or sworn in. So the terms of those who are still with us will officially terminate in January of next year, when the new people are sworn in. So anybody who cannot run again would be covered by this language.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. This was my original thought, early on, when I spoke about my concern about the term limits, and I'm looking at this as, there is a group that is term-limited out right now. There are two groups that are not eligible for reelection. There's one small group that is eligible for reelection this year, but if those four individuals are reelected this coming year, as of January, whenever they get sworn in again, they will be in their last term. And at that point in time, they will be termed out. So it...the language in here really concerns me, that the only people that are going to be termed out, that are going to be left after the termed-out ones, will be people that are in their first legislative session, and that group that has served only two years. So that will be the group where they can pick from. Is that correct in my understanding, Senator Chambers?
