needed to carry out this study? Now I'm going to ask the question a different way. What expert can you think of--I don't mean, you know, a named individual--what specific realm of expertise would not be available when you put all these different members together, and the areas they represent, which would necessitate the hiring of some expert? What would the expert be an expert in, to be hired by this commission?

SENATOR RAIKES: I think the...and I'm guessing here a little bit, Senator, but I think the idea is facilitation. Am I on the right track with that? Is that the person that you're...?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, they're going to hire a facilitator.

SENATOR RAIKES: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if you hire a facilitator, it empowers that person to contract with experts.

SENATOR RAIKES: Oh.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what additional expertise would be needed, when we look at the makeup of this commission, if these people who are listed would be made members of the commission?

SENATOR RAIKES: There's nothing that jumps to mind, unless the facilitator would need a...you know, an additional person to help with the facilitation. I don't know what that might be, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank...I don't, either. Thanks. But I wanted to get your thinking. And after what you said, I can see where an economist might bring something of value, an overall, or as they say, an overarching or umbrella view of all this stuff and help bring it together. But I would like to ask Senator Burling a question, if he can pry himself away.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling, would you yield?
