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between the broad term "agriculture," standing alone, and "production agriculture"? How is production agriculture distinguished from agriculture in general?

SENATOR KREMER: I would think production agriculture would be somebody that's actively involved in the agriculture process, the farmer themselves, rather than an agribusiness, or...that's just off the off of my head. I would have to study it more than that, but production agriculture, I would think, is somebody that's actively involved in the process.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And Senator Kremer, that has always been my understanding, too. But in line with what I've been saying about other parts of this bill, some things, I believe, need to be in the record. I hope this thing doesn't go anywhere, because it's a waste of time, it's a waste of money. But if it should, some guidance, I think, needs to be given to those commissioners. So would it be your desire that when the Governor makes this appointment, it would not be an executive from one of these agribusiness giants, which may either be national or multinational?

SENATOR KREMER: Are you asking me that question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, that's my question.

SENATOR KREMER: Yes, that would definitely be my preference, that it would be somebody that is really in the process of producing agriculture products, and not somebody like you had mentioned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the fact that the word "production" is there is designed to make it clear of what we want in the way of a representative, as far as that person's involvement with agriculture?

SENATOR KREMER: Yes, I would think so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, with that...oh, I'm going to see if anybody else wants to talk. Thank you, Mr. President.
