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very long time, even though you can only die once. I have no belief that anybody's mind is going to be changed on this bill, no matter how long we talk or what is said. But this is the bill that will help poison the well for the rest of the session. I want the Governor to know that, I want the Speaker to know that, and I want Senator Redfield to know it, and everybody else who has anything they want to get through this body. I have been in training, and I am prepared to talk all day, everyday. The citizens of this state foolishly allowed an outfit--I think they hang out around Washington, D.C., or some place else--to spend tremendous amounts of money to achieve the adoption of term limits. It was fueled by, paid for, by the outside interests. After carrying out their nefarious work in the state, they refused to pay the fees and fines that they owed to the Accountability Commission. Since they are joining in the term limits suit, I'm going to ask the Attorney General would it be appropriate to serve papers on one of their representatives to make them pay that money that they owe to the state,...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...unless they have gotten under the wire by way of a statute of limitations. But I'm going to resist this bill, and I'm going to take as much time as is needed. I want Senator Combs to note that I did read in today's paper the arrogant statement of the NRA representative from Washington, D.C., assuring us that they have counted votes, they've got the senators they need, and this bill will pass. So it is not something that has originated with this state. Even at the outset it was outsiders, because they know Nebraska basically is an easy mark, an easy target. Why do you think the term-limits people chose Nebraska? They're easy. I will not go over my amount of time. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Kruse.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I stand in support of the amendment before us, and opposed, lest anybody wonder where I'm at, to the base bill.
