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SENATOR JANSSEN: ...getting up in the morning. But anyway, I am in support of the proposal that is before us, and I hope that it will pass this year.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Time.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Johnson, followed by Senator Erdman and Smith.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President. Senator Loudon, you reminded me of a humorous thing that happened out in Kearney about five years ago, when President Clinton visited our state. The Secret Service came around a few days before that, and there was a convention in Kearney the week that they were there, and they were just aghast when they pulled into the Holiday Inn and the other facilities out there, and virtually every pickup had at least one or two guns in it. They didn't really know where to start. Well, what I want to talk about this morning is this, and obviously, this is a two-sided story. Is Senator Combs here? I had a question of her. Well, my question was this, and perhaps she could...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Combs, would you yield?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Combs, please.

SENATOR COMBS: I'm sorry. I was engaged in another conversation.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Oh, no, that's just fine. My question is this: Is our person that's carrying the concealed weapon, he's at end of the long day, and he stops in at the local tavern to have a brew or two with his buddies. What effect does that have on carrying the concealed gun? Here we have a person that is either slightly inebriated or quite inebriated.

SENATOR COMBS: I think that's covered in the bill, which I have here. You're not to carry them there, and you're also not to have it on your person when you are impaired. So that is
