This amendment, this motion, would allow the discussion of issues raised by Senator Schimek, issues which resulted in questions that Senator Flood attempted to answer. He supports this bill no matter what. I wish he were still on the floor, because I'd like to ask him a question. But this committee amendment is not well drafted. When we read these kind of bills, a lot of people are so eager to just get something across the board, no matter how trashy, poorly crafted, illogical, or unreasonable it is, so they can run out there and tell the NRA they delivered as they were told to do. And I don't know whether they've been promised jobs or what, but find people who are elected officials becoming such sycophants for an outfit like that makes me skeptical.
