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that right. So the fact that it went through the Judiciary Committee doesn't mean anything other than that a piece of trash that previously had gone through the committee was just adopted and sent out here again, because amendments that I had drafted to another piece of garbage apply to this just as well. This is lazy persons' drafting, because it is not done to benefit the people. I wonder if Senator Beutler is here, because we're talking about his amendment. I'd like to ask Senator Beutler a lawyerlike question.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Beutler, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Beutler, would you turn to page 8 and read--you can do it to yourself...I mean, you know, silently--lines 1 and 2, and see if you see any place where words should be inserted?

SENATOR BEUTLER: You're talking about the paragraph that begins "Any peace officer"?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I guess I was of the opinion that after "cause," "cause to believe"...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...should be included.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. And I had offered that as an amendment. But any lawyer or anybody trained in the law or who had been around here would know that the officer does not have probable cause, but has probable cause to believe. Would you agree?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I would agree.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And Senator Beutler hadn't even been following my discussion, because he was in deep debate with the Thomas More of the Legislature, Senator Friend, who now is wandering around like a loose radical, seeking whom he may
