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SENATOR COMBS: Thank you, Mr. President. I guess I...to just respond...and I'm never at a verbal match for Senator Chambers, but I don't consider myself an idiot. But to me, the smartest people in the world are the ones that are willing to admit what they don't know, and when I don't know, I say I don't know, and I go and find out. So that's what...I've got answers to a couple more questions that were posed here. The State Patrol said that access to the information, in answer to Senator Thompson's question about the mentally incompetent people, that they can get them, access them in Nebraska, and then in another jurisdiction will depend upon the confidentiality laws that they have in the state that they're looking at. And they must be adjudged, and that means adjudicated mentally incompetent, and a judge has to be the one to commit them. So it couldn't be something that was just, you know, an accusation that someone makes that you are mentally incompetent. It has to be...you have to be adjudged as mentally incompetent. And I would just wonder if someone who's been adjudged mentally incompetent would be able to pass the...you know, the testing that's involved. There's...you know, I think...I've taken the testing, and you know, three days of testing, it would be hard for a mentally incompetent person to endure what I went through to get my permit. Another question posed was about the degree of training it takes for a citizen compared to what a police officer has in order to carry, the contention being that ordinary citizens would be incapable of being trained to safely and effectively use a firearm for self-defense. Well, just very simply stated, I think it's a little bit elitist to argue that ordinary citizens are incapable of being properly trained, because, you know, this argument that only law enforcement officers should be permitted to carry, because they are required to undergo the long, rigorous training. The training necessary for citizens and law enforcement is different because the objectives are different. And if you look at what a citizen's goal is, that is to survive an attack. It's to survive a life-threatening encounter, and most often involves scaring away an attacker without a shot being fired, and seeking safety. Most of the time, many times, that's what happens. Law enforcement officers require more extensive training because they must engage in pursuit, apprehension, and suspect control. In other words,
