SENATOR ERDMAN: I wonder if Senator Schimek would yield to a question, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, I would.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Senator Schimek, I listened to your testimony about the desire to recommit this bill to committee and I'm just curious, would you support any form of a concealed weapon permit, regardless? I mean, we could send it back to the committee. I'm just trying to understand what your position might be; whether you're opposed to any concealed weapon permit or whether you're...because your testimony, or your comments, go beyond the concealed weapon and more towards eliminating guns or protecting guns in some other way. I'm just trying to understand.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. And that's a fair question, and I'm utterly opposed to any concealed carry bill. That's for the record. But I also believe that each one of us in here has a huge responsibility to pass legislation that is not going to cause all kinds of complications down the line. And I don't know, but I suspect the bill, as is, could cause all kinds of court cases, could cause consternation within cities and villages across Nebraska. So that's my thinking on it from that point.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay. I just, for my own sake, and I know that you have been a strong opponent to this proposal, as has Senator Chambers. I just was trying to understand whether your position was we should send it back to the committee so that we could get it in a form that you could support, or whether your goal was to send it back to committee to try to work out some of these issues and you would still oppose it, but it may be better than what it currently...what you currently feel it was in. And I think that's fair for what...for what you are trying to attempt. Thank you, Mr. President.
