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on your motion to recommit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm still crafting what I consider corrective and improving amendments to this atrocity. If I wanted to just offer amendments for the sake of amendments, I wouldn't even take the time to read through this thing. I would just offer an amendment that says strike Section 1, strike Section 2, strike subsection, and on and on, and put a thousand amendments up here, which would be very easy to do. And if this thing moves, that's what I do intend to do, not just on this bill but others, too. I said early on this poisons the well. You can do a favor to somebody if you want to, and it's early in the session and you don't think far. But as we start getting to the end, don't get angry at me. Don't come to me. And you think because you are not exhausted yet and you've made little deals among yourself that what I'm saying now is so much smoke, but I say it so it's in the record and I can copy the transcript and hand it out to you and remind you, all of you. There is no question that I'm opposed to a bill like this in any form, but it is so atrociously drafted that a lot of work needs to be done on it, and it shouldn't be mine. The kind of amendments I'm drafting should be drafted by those who support it, but they won't take the time to read it. Something as obvious as the one I mentioned this morning, where the...when they're talking about probable cause. They should have written "probable cause to believe"; "the officer has probable cause to believe." That is the formula that people who watch television detective and cop shows know is the appropriate way to express that idea, but while legislation is being drafted, it's not. Senator Combs said that, in her opinion, the wisest person is the one who can admit error. I'm paraphrasing. Well, that's a step toward being wise. But if a person doesn't have enough understanding and knowledge to recognize that an error is made, then no changes can be made. And the people who are supporting this bill have not read it. I have read it. I'd like to ask Senator Louden a question before I proceed, because I want to be sure I didn't misunderstand something he said.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Louden, would you yield to a question from Senator Chambers?
