homes, cities, states and regions in the U.S., where there are more guns, both men and women are at higher risk for homicide. particularly firearm homicide. Another one on homicide by Wiebe found that using nationally representative population survey data and mortality follow-back data on homicide and suicide victims, it was found that adults in homes with guns were at significantly higher risk of suicide and homicide than adults in homes without guns. And listen to this. The risk of homicide was particularly high among women compared with men. one by P.J. Cook and M. Moore found and was printed in Homicide: A Sourcebook of Social Research, at Thousand Oaks, California, and it's from a particular chapter. It reviews trends in gun ownership and examines use of guns for self-defense and for criminal purposes, concluding that gun use for self-defense is relatively rare and, secondly, while there is little evidence that robbery and assault rates are influenced by gun prevalence, there is compelling evidence of a strong association between guns and lethal, lethal robbery and assault. The relationship between instrumentality and availability of guns and homicide is explored, and public policy recommendations for reducing oun violence are made. Another one on homicide, and this one was done by A.L. Kellermann and F.P. Rivara, and N.B. Rushforth.
