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can't pass concealed carry, but they do it in other states? I don't understand, folks. It's time. Let's get on with it. Let's have this vote, and let's move on. And you know, if you don't pass it, it's going to come back, and it's going to come back. And pretty soon we'll be the last state. Well, you know, that doesn't show much leadership, does it? It's time to get on with this; it's time to vote and get on with this. It's not been a problem in other states; it's not going to be a problem here. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Howard.

SENATOR HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. Actually, I am very much in support of what Senator Stuthman has described, and having come from Douglas County, where I spent many afternoons, mornings, in Juvenile Court on child-related issues, I always had to pass through a metal detector. There are two entrances in that courthouse; we always had to put anything we were carrying on a conveyor belt, and I don't think it's unrealistic to expect that if we do have concealed carry in this state, that smaller communities are going to have to also have those measures in their community courthouses. And I've marveled at the openness of the Unicameral itself, and there are many, many entrances here. How would there be any measure to protect or to ensure that concealed carry did not come into this building? Would we have the security forces at every doorway? Would we have conveyor belts, and would we have surveillance equipment to detect whether people are bringing this in? I think this would certainly cause a jam-up of the lobbyists, if we put such a thing into practice. And thank you, Mr. President. I will return my time to you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Howard. Further discussion on the motion to reconsider offered by Senator Chambers, on the motion to recommit? Senator Chambers, there are no lights on. Did you wish to close on your motion?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may do so.
