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to time where I deem it appropriate, but I wouldn't do it in the way that I do now. We need to set up a position in the Legislature, occupied by somebody such as myself, who has the physical strength and the fearlessness, if that's what it takes, to drag one of these "donkeys"...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...out of that podium. Get them out immediately; throw them out, or, as I say, throw the bum out. And I would apologize to the bums for that. I'm getting it all out of my system, or most of it, now, so that I won't have to dribble it and trickle it out during the rest of the day. I hope that my view on this thing is clear. How much time do I have, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About 20 seconds, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I just want to take that time to indicate that the rules are sent to each one of these persons before they come here. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Howard.

SENATOR HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members of the body, and I would like to address the confirmation and to thank Senator Flood for standing up and confirming the vote that we gave to the individual who is working with the Norfolk facility. I know that the employees up in Norfolk are going through a difficult time, and I appreciate the sense of respect and camaraderie that's been offered to them. And I support this appointment, and having said that I would like to offer the remainder of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

Somebody looking from the outside may not view this as a collegial body, but to be collegial does not mean we agree with each other all the time on every issue. We know what the rules are.
