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for the cities. The city sets up a city charter, a constitution, and if it operates under a city charter that does certain sorts of things, then they have somewhat broader prerogatives than municipalities that operate strictly under the statutes. It's a self-governing, self-ruling sort of concept that came about when the Legislature decided that, look, these cities and municipalities can deal with most of their problems themselves, and we ought to allow them a structure that allows people to vote on a basic constitution for the city, and then that constitution for the city can't be changed unless the people vote the change in. And from that constitution, then, they make their ordinances and resolutions. So what they did in the case of this Community Health Endowment, they put a new section...the people voted on a new section in the city charter. It establishes a separate fund to be known as the Community Health Endowment, recites the fact that they're putting in there the proceeds from the sale of the hospital, and it says the endowment may be increased by donations, bequests, and appropriations to the fund. Monies in the fund shall be used for the purpose of funding health and health-related programs or projects which further the health, safety, or welfare of the citizens of the city of Lincoln, and for no other purpose, and for no other purpose. Then it goes on to say that notwithstanding any other provision to this charter to the contrary, all monies in the Community Health Endowment shall, to the extent permissible under the statutory and constitutional laws, be invested in investments of the nature which individuals of prudent discretion and intelligence acquire or retain in dealing with the property of another. That standard is a very high standard, and if we change our constitution and our statutes to allow the city of Lincoln to do this, they will still have to operate under this charter standard, should this charter standard be higher than what the Legislature should require by its own statutes. So the city council of the city of Lincoln, I think, acted very wisely in putting to the people this proposition and putting in a very strong position the provisions with respect to how the health endowment will operate. Then subsequent to the people approving this foundation, they put into effect a set of ordinances which follow that requirement. They have a board; the board consists of 15 individuals from the community that are known as trustees,
