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community, and such report shall include a description of past years' accomplishments, current or anticipated funding priorities, and a financial audit. So they're...it's a wide-open financial audit every year, and it's reported publicly to the city council and to the mayor. The newspapers can be all over it. So with that, that's another piece of what I wanted to let you know, and I think I'll stop speaking and pick up again on my next opportunity. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I shall pick up where I left off. When a constitution is being drafted, I think there should be much greater care than when a statute is under consideration. I think statutes ought to be drafted carefully, too. But not as much damage is done, regardless of how "bunglesomely" or incompetently a statute may be drafted. On the other hand, the constitution is the fundamental or basic law of the state, and when we are going to just throw words in because some lobbyists and others who have a specific, narrow agenda want to get their interests taken care of, and all else is of no great relevance, problems, from my point of view, develop in terms of the integrity of the constitution as the document serving the purpose it is designed to serve. So some of this wording, even if I were in support of the provision, the proposal, would be changed if I had anything to do with it. And I don't know how much I'm going to have to do with it, but it's obvious that this is not too important, because nobody from...let me ask...no, I won't ask questions. I won't waste my time or anybody else's. Nobody from Lincoln is prioritizing this bill, this proposal. Nobody from Lincoln is prioritizing the proposal. The city council of Lincoln is able to make money available for any or all of these projects. We've seen in Omaha and other cities where various groups and efforts receive funding from the city council, and in some cases, a county board. So there is a way currently for Lincoln to keep these programs going, but the programs are not important enough for Lincoln to dip into its general funds to provide money. So because of this hospital situation, Lincoln is trying to get the Legislature to amend the
