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I think it's fair to Senator Beutler and Landis to point that out. They have worked to try to address those concerns, and I think they have worked diligently not only within the Urban Affairs Committee and within the community that they represent, but obviously, within the other entities that are interested. So I wanted to bring that to the body's attention. I think this, realistically, is whether you should do this or not, not necessarily whether or not there can be restrictions placed on these funds in how they can be used, because that is provided in the constitutional language. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Erdman. Mr. Clerk, please, motion.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to amend with FA382. (Legislative Journal page 531.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, to open on FA382 to AM0022.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm going to float some innocuous amendments which will not hurt the bill at all, but would narrow it in terms of better drafting. And if those cannot be adopted, then I would say that my approach to the bill will become hardened. Here is what this first proposal would do. On page 1, in lines 17 and 18, then again in line 21, I would strike the words "governmental or." Those words are a part of this phraseology: "and other governmental or political subdivisions." We don't need "governmental or." Any political subdivision of the state is governmental by definition. If it's not governmental, it's not a political subdivision. There is no entity which is going to be handling public funds in the manner anticipated by this constitutional proposal, no entity, which would not be a political subdivision. If it's not a political subdivision, then it would not be affected by this proposal. I'm going to listen and see if somebody can tell me a governmental subdivision, as the language says, which is not a political subdivision. There is no entity which would be a subdivision of the government which is not embraced in the term "political subdivision." That's what "political subdivision" means. To try to give an example, the letters HIV form an acronym for
