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SENATOR LOUDEN: In other words, where these people are...where these are receiving money now is from some kind of a private endowment fund or private trust fund that does this sort of thing and puts out this money for these different areas that are doing good things for people and that sort of thing? Is that what this handout is all about?

SENATOR BEUTLER: If I'm understanding what you're saying, Senator, the answer is yes. This...these...this community endowment that we've been talking about all morning makes about \$8 million in grants across the community every year, and notwithstanding their 4 or less percent rate of return, which gives you an idea of the scale that they could be...on which they could be more helpful if the investment return were higher. But with that interest money that they get off of the main body of money, they apply that interest money by giving grants to these various organizations. And these various organizations are the hands-on organizations that do the work with the community in their particular areas, as described here. They may (inaudible)...

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay. Now, these...this listing you have here then, these are people that are receiving money from this...what do you call it, Lincoln community grant, or whatever it is?

SENATOR BEUTLER: The community health fund of Lincoln. Yes, right.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Community (inaudible)...

SENATOR LOUDEN: And that health fund is controlled by the city of Lincoln?

SENATOR BEUTLER: It's controlled by a board that's appointed by the mayor of the city of Lincoln, and operates under the ordinances in the city charter of the city of Lincoln.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay. Then...and your whole idea of this
