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And Senator Bourne now does that on purpose, if he knows that I'm paying attention. But a word which many people misapply, and you will see it misapplied everywhere, that word is "testament." Everybody in law school knows that this word relates to the writing of a will, disposing of your property after you croak. The one who writes the will is the testator. If you die without a will, you are intestate. "Testament" relates to writing of a will, or transmitting something after death, things along that line. So why do all these intelligent people say, this particular act is a testament to somebody's good character? What they mean is "testimonial." They're not talking about a testament; they are talking about a testimonial. So why will those whose language it is mess it up so much, then put in their constitutions and laws that you should have a knowledge of the English language? What does that mean? When they say "knowledge," does that mean you have to be able to speak it grammatically? Is idiomatic speaking acceptable? Not if you're in polite society. You use what they call standard English. What is standard English? Standard English is the way that the important, educated, hoity-toity people in a society speak. That's what standard English is. If instead of, throw the bum out, they say, "trow" the bum out, that's standard English. And if you're around those people and you have the occasion to use the word "throw," you drop the "h" and you say "trow." If the right person is important enough and is speaking, and he says, because men set the standard, I want that youse guys know what it is that I'm talking about, then if you get up to speak, you better say "youse guys," because if you don't, you'll get one of those looks as if, oh, youse trying to make fun of me? So you have to determine how standards are set, who sets the standard, and whether the standard goes across the board from the Pacific Ocean to the Atlantic Ocean, or if it's regional, or even local, and then adjust your conduct accordingly. That's all that I have to say with reference to this amendment which is pending. It would strike the word "in," and substitute the two words "required by." Senator Langemeier has agreed with the amendment, so I will ask that it be adopted. Thank you, Mr. President.
