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the word that ought to be inserted. And every place that I have used "fewer," it's talking about a number, a number of years or months or whatever it is. I don't remember every thing where it occurred. But that's what this amendment would do, and I'll wait to see how Senator Langemeier feels about that. And I'm unable to pose any questions, because either he would agree with the amendment or he would not. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You heard the opening on FA392. Open for discussion. There are no lights on, Senator...it just came on. Senator Langemeier.

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I do agree with the amendment to take the "not less" and the "less" out, and go to the "no fewer" and "fewer"; add some consistency to the bill. That was drafted over from old language in the past; it's using "lesses." And so I do accept the amendment. Thank you. I yield my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Langemeier. Now there are no lights on. You're recognized to close, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I don't want these first words to be misunderstood, but they lead into what I'm going to say. When I was younger, but not a lad--some people in here were lads and lasses--this song started, and it was sung by females: This is dedicated to the one I love. That's the way the song started. Then they sang, melodious, beautiful. The musicality was, how do you say, magnifique. Well, this amendment was dedicated to one whom I deeply respect, and of whom I am very fond--Senator DiAnna Schimek. Sometimes we just cringe together when we see "less" where it should be "fewer." So when that first "less" jumped out and hit me between the eyes, figuratively speaking, I said, because of how Senator Schimek and I feel about this, I'm going to go through the bill, and every place I see that word used where it ought not to be, I'm going to correct it. So I want Senator Schimek to know that she has partial responsibility for this amendment. And that's all I will have to say on it. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard
