are businesses that must have databases that contain this type of information in order for them to perform their business. What happens in the event that there is a breach of this security? Not certainly by sloppiness on the part of the business; it may be a renegade employee, it may actually have been a hacker from outside that has breached every fire wall known to man as they stay ahead of technology. So what happens in that event? And LB 917 is how you deal with it. It asks that this business conduct an investigation in the event that there is lost data or they have reason to believe that data has been breached. It requires them to give a notice to the customers in their database so that they are empowered to take steps to protect their identity. It also provides some provision for our Attorney General in an amendment that was offered by Senator Mines into the bill the day of the hearing, and was accepted by the committee. So that's what LB 917 is about. It's about that unfortunate event when a database is actually breached. If you look at the amendment on page 3, the key area that we're talking about is, what is the personal information we're talking about? We're not talking about names and addresses that are found in a phone book. We're not talking about something that would be a public document that would be readily available. What we are talking about is when they use their first name in conjunction with, on page 4, (a) a Social Security number; (b) your motor vehicle operator's license number or a state I.D. card number; (c) an account number or credit or debit card number, in combination with any required security code, access code, or password that would permit access to a resident's financial account; (d) a unique electronic identification number or routing code; (e) unique biometric data, such as a fingerprint, voice print, or retina or iris image, or other unique physical representation. So we are talking about very, very specific data that would endanger your financial future and would put you at risk of identity theft. In Section 3, it talks about the required investigation that must occur. It must be done very promptly, very quickly, so that, in fact, if a notice is required and they determine that you are at risk of damage or potential damage, that you will be notified and can take steps to protect yourself. investigation determines that the use of information about a Nebraska resident for an unauthorized purpose has occurred or is
